A Poisoned Legacy?

At our January meeting, John Cooper, Director of Fellowship of Reconciliation UK, spoke to us about the ongoing campaign concerning the long-lasting aftermath of British nuclear testing in the Pacific.

In the 1950s a total of 33 tests were carried out on Kiritimati ("Christmas Island") and the Malden Islands – 9 by the UK, 24 by the USA. The testing was needed for propaganda and scientific purposes. Britain first carried out tests in Australia before moving to carrying out atmospheric tests in the Pacific; Kiritimati was described as "uninhabited", but this was far from being the case. The USA tested there in preference to the alternative Texas, and France also carried out many tests in the region. The first UK explosion in 1952 contaminated the land and also the sea, which the population

depended on for their livelihood. This first bomb was 50 times the size of Hiroshima. (See video https://bit.ly/3Dm4AC9)

There then followed more tests in 1968 – 240 times more powerful than Hiroshima. As well as the fallout from the bombs, barrels of radio-active waste were dumped into the sea, the area was regularly sprayed with DDT, and vehicles were abandoned all across the island. In October 1958 a moratorium on atmospheric testing was declared, but the poisoned legacy remains – including the impact on the environment and on animals. Ernest Cox, a civilian working for the UK Atomic Weapons Research Establishment visited soon after the testing and noticed no flies, no lizards, no booby birds, and dead fish being washed up.

Today, 48 of those present at the tests are still alive, as well as about 800 descendants. Researcher Dr Becky Alexis-Martin - spoke to survivors. They remembered being put under a tarpaulin during the tests and described health problems and food poisoning. The military personnel were ordered not to eat the local food and the Duke of Edinburgh was advised not to drink the water.

There are many testimonies of those who survived and are still living in these islands (see ICAN website https://bit.ly/3RdNzzG), which are currently at risk from rising sea levels. Articles 6 and 7 of the TPNW call for reparation both for the victims and for the environment.

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BITS FROM ABROAD

President Vladimir Putin said on Tuesday that **Russia** was suspending its participation in the New START treaty with the United States that limits the two sides' strategic nuclear arsenals. Putin stressed that Russia was not withdrawing from the treaty but the suspension further imperils the last remaining pillar of arms control between the United States and Russia, which between them hold nearly 90% of the world's nuclear warheads.

International atomic monitors in Iran last week detected uranium enriched to levels just below that needed for a nuclear weapon, according to two senior diplomats, underscoring the risk that the country's unrestrained atomic activities could prompt a new crisis. The International Atomic Energy Agency is trying to clarify how Iran accumulated uranium enriched to 84% purity — the highest level found by inspectors in the country to date, and a concentration just 6% below what's needed for a weapon. TRIDENT AND RELATED NEWS

A nuclear engineer glued broken submarine bolts back together in an "unforgivable" error. The unsatisfactory repairs to HMS Vanguard's cooling pipes were discovered after a bolt fell off whilst being tightened during checks inside the reactor chamber. It is understood that the bolts, which were providing insulation onto elements of the pipework, snapped off after being over-tightened and were then glued back on by staff at Babcock, a defence contractor. However, Navy sources criticised the nuclear engineering company for a lack of "transparency" for having reported an issue, but failing to disclose all the details. They said: "Nuclear engineering is meticulously managed and while the effect of this failure is insignificant, the actual act is unforgivable. Three senior ministry of defence officials have received more than £200,000 in performance bonuses despite not being able to get a Scottish-based nuclear submarine back in service more than seven years after it started undergoing a refit and refuelling. The MoD had hoped that HMS Vanguard would be returned to Royal Navy service at Faslane last summer but The Sunday Times has learnt that the repair and refuelling project for the Trident missile-armed vessel has hit new snags. However, the three top executives at the ministry's Submarine Delivery Agency, which is responsible for keeping the navy's submarines in working order, were paid performance bonuses last year. Its chief executive, Ian Booth, received £95,000 on top of his £290,000 salary before he retired just before Christmas, according to the agency's accounts. The development of the new **Sizewell C** nuclear power station has reached a 'significant milestone' with the creation of an access route on to the site. Work began on Tuesday to remove trees on Goose Hill to make way for the access road, including mature Corsican Pine, Scots Pine and some semi-mature pine trees, none of which are indigenous to Suffolk. The new station will sit on a six hectare space, or 5% of the Sizewell Marshes Site of Special Scientific interest (SSSI), while the remaining 95% is being protected and managed for wildlife. *East Anglian Daily Times 15th Feb 2023* https://bit.ly/3kflxH1
