Stop nuclear weapons returning to the UK!

Lakenheath Alliance for Peace was launched in March to campaign against the proposed return of US nuclear weapons to the UK. Fourteen organisations have already joined the group (including CND) and members have delivered a letter to the base commander at RAF Lakenheath.



There will be an international peace camp from 13th – 25th July where participants from other US bases in Europe and campaigners from across the world are expected to be present. There is a plan to walk or cycle over three days from Norwich to Lakenheath to establish a continuous presence at the base until the end of the camp. TRIDENT AND RELATED NEWS

British military aircraft regularly carry highly radioactive material across the Atlantic to one of the RAF's largest bases on flights vital to the Trident nuclear weapons system, according to new research. The little-known flights are a lifeline sustaining the 'special relationship' embodied in the secretive US-UK Mutual Defence Agreement due to be renewed later this year without the need for any parliamentary scrutiny or even approval. At least ten of the special round trips between RAF Brize Norton in Oxfordshire and US military bases, usually by large RAF C-17 Globemaster transport aircraft, take place every year, according to Nukewatch, which monitors traffic in nuclear weapons and their components.

The UK Government has been urged to "come clean" on the state of the nuclear infrastructure at Faslane after new images of a submarine returning from patrol showed obvious rust and missing panelling. The Vanguard-class submarine – one of four which are supposed to patrol the oceans carrying the UK's nuclear weapon deterrent at all times – was photographed by locals near Helensburgh as it returned from a patrol mission which lasted in excess of six months. Patrols have grown longer and longer in recent years in order to cover for the fact that two of the UK's four Vanguard-class nuclear submarines are currently in maintenance – and three of them should have already been retired.

The House of Commons Public Accounts Committee (PAC) has identified a gap in parliamentary scrutiny of Ministry of Defence (MOD) spending in a report published in March. The report, which focusses on the MOD's 2023-2033 Equipment Plan, states that some parts of the plan "cannot be scrutinised in the public domain for security reasons" and that none of the arrangements and mandates of the other relevant committees allow for proper scrutiny of these areas.

NUCLEAR POWER

The country's civil nuclear industry is set to expand under the government's ambitions set out in the *Civil nuclear: Roadmap to 2050*, where it said it wants to see 24GW of new nuclear delivered, including by large nuclear plants such as Sizewell C, as well as small modular reactors (SMRs) and advanced modular reactors (AMRs). A significant uplift in workforce capacity will need to take place to deliver that ambition and the government said 50% more highly skilled workers will be needed in the next 10 years for both the nuclear weapons and civil nuclear power industries. ... "The investment in nuclear skills," the government said, "includes £350M from the government and more than £400M from industry", which will "create some 5,000 new apprenticeships in the next four years."

HINKLEY Point C has helped boost the population of young people aged 25 to 39 in the Bridgwater area by a quarter, a new report has found. The report, published by EDF, says there has been a 25 per cent growth in that demographic in the Sedgemoor area since the project began - a figure three times greater than the national average. According to the HPC Socio-Economic Impact Report 2024, the nuclear construction project is "providing an opportunity for young people to stay and thrive in West Somerset and Sedgemoor, an area with a history of low social mobility and an ageing population".



Hazel Neal

Sadly, longtime supporter Hazel Neal passed away in February this year. The story of Hazel's activism in CND began when she was about ten years old, being taken on a CND march by

her mother. Although she never had the chance to check where or when that was, the campaign never left her. In Birmingham she became active in WMCND, helping with Hiroshima Day exhibitions and on demonstrations. When the women's peace camp was established in the early '80s at Greenham Common, it made absolute sense for her to join the camp.

Hazel's political activity included travel to international peace camps. She organised Conscientious Objectors Day in Birmingham and owned one share in BAE Systems, so that she had a voice as a member of Campaign Against the Arms Trade at shareholders' meetings. Another regular commitment was helping at the Coventry Peace House night shelter for refugees and asylum seekers.

In 2016 she had an accident that resulted in a catastrophic neck injury. and she became dependent on other people, living in a care home for the last few years. It was a huge adjustment but she was determined to cope.

If there was one word that defined Hazel, it was activism - but she was also a good friend. She brought a great deal of kindness and compassion into people's lives. Hazel was much loved and she will be missed. Her radiant smile will never be forgotten.
